President's Message

In this brutal economy, more Durham families struggling paycheck to paycheck are hitting that one emergency – the loss of a job, an injury or illness, the loss of a relative's support – that plunges them into homelessness.

Though economic conditions threaten working-poor families and young adults worse than I've ever seen, I'm pleased to report that Genesis Home has never been stronger or better situated to help them. There are two reasons for that: The surging support for Genesis Home's work by the local community and careful planning by the Board of Directors that governs Genesis Home on that community's behalf.

In late 2007, the board could already see economic conditions making it difficult for even families with two working parents to afford rudimentary housing, utilities and day care. For years before the economic weather had begun to darken, our board had worked with determination to strengthen Genesis Home's financial position. Because the need for Genesis Home's services is greatest when times are leanest, we retired debt, built responsible financial reserves, began an endowment fund and began connecting with new partners.

Again and again we have been inspired at how deeply the local community, which owns Genesis Home, believes in this work and how happy you are to share from your abundance to help our neighbors when they need it. We count among our hundreds of friends and investors local foundations and faith communities; companies, couples and kids; former clients and former chief executive officers.

So, as this economic crisis sends record numbers of people to our door asking for help, Genesis Home – far from struggling to survive – is enacting a new plan to serve more people more effectively. Your gifts not only continue Genesis Home's work but expand the reach of those efforts.

The Board of Directors, after several months of deliberation, finalized our Strategic Road Map early in 2007 to move Genesis Home aggressively toward an audacious long-term vision: ending homelessness in Durham. That's right. In partnership with all the other fine community groups working to help the poor here, we want to make it impossible to become homeless in Durham – or at least to stay homeless for more than a few hours.

For a few years, we've been doing some important things in service of that vision, such as shortening families' stays in our shelter and getting them into their own homes faster and faster. We've begun moving many families directly into permanent housing. And our case managers are visiting both kinds of families in their new homes to help them with problems and prevent a relapse into homelessness.

Now we've set new goals: We want to constantly refine Genesis Home's "Curriculum for Change," our holistic program of support that helps families return to self-sufficiency. So we're doing an academic study of national best practices to see which ones we can integrate here. We're looking to share our own innovations nationally, as well.

And we have resolved to broaden our strategies to do more to influence the local economic weather. We want to encourage the creation of more safe, decent affordable housing options and good-paying jobs in Durham – for Genesis Home graduates, yes, but also to allow low-wealth families to avoid homelessness altogether. This is an entirely new direction for us.

To expand Genesis Home's reach and vision, the board needs to win increased support from you and others. You own this good work, and if you agree your money and volunteer efforts are well invested, please join me in increasing your commitment and sharing the opportunity with your friends, business colleagues and neighbors.

I am in awe of what we are poised to achieve together – now, when Durham needs us most.

Director's Letter

I have come to learn in my time at Genesis Home that there is a very real need for education and outreach when it comes to the issue of homelessness and the people it touches. Members of the community crave knowledge about the scope of the issue and specifics about the stories of the clients who have used our programs as an opportunity to regroup and move forward toward a better tomorrow. These stories create a bond. They tug at our heartstrings and help us see homelessness not as a vague social ill but as a real tragedy that captures our brothers, wives, daughters, family and friends.

I sometimes worry that the stories you hear may romanticize the harsh reality that is homelessness. The truth is that we're hearing more and more sad stories every day. I am often asked by members of the community, "how bad is it?" The answer is that it's as bad as you think it is. In 2008, Genesis Home provided 62% more shelter nights to homeless families and young adults than it did in 2007. Our local "Point in Time" count of the homeless population rose for the fourth straight year. The demand for food, clothing and shelter has increased dramatically at Genesis Home and at other service providers in Durham. The foreclosure crisis, rising unemployment, higher food costs, and the recession have conspired to put our goal of ending homelessness even further out of reach.

Before you start looking for the nearest tall building, I'd ask that you keep things in perspective. This community has seen hard times before and we'll certainly see them again. Although 2009 looks like a challenging year, Genesis Home is prepared to weather the storm while continuing to provide the housing and services that our families and young adults so desperately need. In tough times, we all have to rely on our friends to get through. If you're taking the time to read this, I hope that you'll turn words into action and help out by volunteering your time, making an in-kind gift, or making a financial contribution. With friends like you, we think that the future – for all of us – will be bright. Thank you for supporting our work.

At Genesis Home our volunteers are helping us change the lives of the families and children we serve by providing critical services that enhance the overall impact of our programs. In 2008, 553 volunteers contributed 2,019.5 hours of service in a variety of ways including: serving on our Board, providing tutoring and enrichment activities for our children and young adults, repairing and improving the facility, and hosting activities in the community to raise awareness and funds for Genesis Home.

In the work of our volunteers as they dedicate their time and talent; in the faces of the children enthralled by a good book; in the generosity of the countless individuals who donate goods, services, and funding to Genesis Home – in all of these, we see the world changing for the families, children, and young adults we serve at Genesis Home.

Links, Inc. is a national African-American women's service organization that has been active in Durham since the late 1950s. For the past six years members of the Durham chapter have been coming monthly to Genesis Home's house meetings to present a workshop series on family health and healthy behaviors. Other members of the group have gone beyond the house meetings to dedicate additional time to working one-on-one with the children living in the house. Rosiland Wallace is one of those committed volunteers. She shares her story, and the impact made on her life by the children she has worked with, because often our volunteers get as much as they give.

"One of my many passions is working with children and helping to make a difference in their lives. As a result, I have had the opportunity to share my talents by reading to the children at Genesis Home and helping with the Holiday Dinners hosted there in December. These occasions have made me reminisce about my own son and my delights in seeing him relish the joys of special times with me. Children like to feel special, and I have had a chance to share the joy of making them feel that way during my time at Genesis Home.

As we all know, children are our most important resource and our future. To see the faces of the children light up as they would hang on each word I read from an interesting book, just waiting to hear and see my expressions, made all my time with them even more rewarding. Asking questions about the book and explaining the meaning of new words is another way I try to impact their learning which will hopefully benefit them in their daily lives. Their excited faces; the hugging and snuggling; and me trying to make the book come alive, was an awesome feeling! As they looked at the pictures, I felt them transport themselves into the story line, and sometimes they took the book away from me, as if to try to capture those small moments in time that felt comforting and fun to them... If for any amount of time I somehow made them forget the sadness I knew they sometimes felt, I knew I was in the right place and had done the right thing!

The time I spent with the children at Genesis Home transported me into those special times and places I shared over the years with my own son as a youngster. Their smiles lead me to believe the joy was mutual."

I was involved in a horrible, violent relationship when Genesis Home gave me a chance to escape my situation. I was so thankful when I was given the opportunity to become a resident because it gave me and my children a chance to start over, and be in the company of other people struggling to overcome their own challenges. From the moment I arrived I felt comfortable and hopeful. I met great people, both residents and staff, who made me and my family, feel right at home. Not only that, but they provided support and encouragement to help us get back on track.

My case manager, Betty Burton, was particularly instrumental to my efforts to get me and my family set on the right path. She consulted with me on a weekly basis, going over my short and long term goals and offering insight, resources and advice to help me reach these goals. Another activity that really helped me was the weekly house meetings. We would all get together and talk and offer each other motivation and advice. It was a great way for us to establish a family-like relationship with everyone in the house. I always looked forward to those meetings because I always learned something that would motivate me or help me to achieve my personal goals.

We each had chores assigned to us. We were expected to keep our living room in order and our kitchen space clean. There was also a curfew that was enforced, and I have to admit that it wasn't always a delight, but I understood why it was in place. Any time you make a drastic change in your life you have to make some sacrifices, and in the end the sacrifices I made during that time were all gained back in the lessons that I learned. I realized that the rules were in place to keep you focused on your goals. As a result of my hard work and focus I was able to achieve my goals. I was able to get a good job and a nice, safe place for me and my family. My transition time had come to an end, and I was able to move on the next chapter of my life.

Betty was the best case manager I could have asked for. She provided great guidance for me during my time of need. She became someone that I admired not just as a mentor, but someone that I trusted as a friend. After leaving Genesis Home things have not been easy - life's curve balls come at you no matter what. But I am determined not to fall into the same circumstances again, and through the knowledge and leadership I received from Betty and the rest of the staff at Genesis Home, I have been able to hit those curve balls out of the park! I love my family too much to let the negatives consume me, and I am determined not to let them down.

My life has moved on and I still feel strong. I am thankful that Genesis Home was able to provide the strength I needed when I was weak, sad, hurt, troubled, and displaced. I finally understood why it was called Genesis Home - it is a place to dwell and start your life in a better direction.

This past year I had a problem during the holidays and called Genesis Home for help. They assisted me with warmth and sincerity, and I was truly grateful. You never know when you may need to call on help from "home". I would like to thank Betty and the Genesis Home staff for always being a home to me and my family. I love you all.

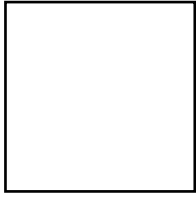
